Material means what is the product made out of? What materials is the product made from? Why were these materia used? Would a different material be better? How was the product mode? What manufacturing techniques were used?



This afternoon we are going to study a range of packaging to gain a greater understanding. Then using **ACCESS FM** we will analyse these which is a typical question in **SECTION A**. We use **ACCESS FM** to help us write a **specification** - a list of requirements for a design - and to help us **analyse and describe** an already existing product.

ACCESS FM - Helpsheet



M is for Material



Aesthetics means what does the product look like? What is the: Colour? Shape? Texture? Pattern? Appearance? Feel? Weight? Style?



Cost means **how much does the product cost to buy?** How much does it: Cost to buy? Cost to make? How much do the different materials cost? Is it good value?



Customer means **who will buy or use your product?** Who will buy your product? Who will use your product? What is their: Age? Gender? What are their: Likes? Dislikes? Needs? Preferences?



Environment means will the product affect the environment? Is the product: Recyclable? Reuseable? Repairable? Sustainable? Environmentally friendly? Bad for the environment? 6R's of Design: Recycle / Reuse / Repair / Rethink / Reduce / Refuse



Size means how big or small is the product?

What is the size of the product in millimeters (mm)? Is this the same size as similar products? Is it comfortable to use? Does it fit? Would it be improved if it was bigger or smaller?



Safety means how safe is the product when it is used?

Will it be safe for the customer to use? Could they hurt themselves? What's the correct and safest way to use the product? What are the risks?



Function means how does the product work?


